

Thomas Receives Wilbur A. Myers Certified Nurse Aide Award and Scholarship

esley Village's Lindsey Thomas, CNA, was named the 2008 recipient of the Wilbur A. Myers Certified Nurse Aide Award at a May 9 dinner. She was also awarded the Wilbur A. Myers Scholarship, which is presented annually to a nursing employee interested in continuing his or her nursing education. Thomas received a medal commemorating the award, and her name will be inscribed on a perpetual plaque on display in the Partridge-Tippett Nursing Facility Lobby. She will begin full-time in the nursing program at Luzerne County Community College in September.

Thomas has a long history with Wesley Village, first visiting as a six-year-old to sing Christmas carols with her Brownie troop. She continued volunteering as a teen, and began working at Wesley Village in 2004, completing the nurse's aide training course soon after.

Said Wesley Village Director of Nursing Patt Vitale, RN, "Although many people become nurses, only a select few truly possess a love for nursing. I believe Lindsey is one of these few. I am sure she will become a registered nurse Mr. Myers would have been proud of."

The Wilbur A. Myers Certified Nurse Aide Award and the Wilbur A. Myers Scholarship were instituted in 1993 by a trust established by Myers for the benefit of Wesley Village's skilled nursing employees. Myers was a prominent Wilkes-Barre area businessman whose wife was a Wesley Village resident. Myers believed his wife received exceptional care at Wesley, and he wished to offer recognition and advancement opportunities for staff by creating a trust that funds both the award and half the cost of the scholarship winner's registered nursing courses (the Homes pays for the other half). The certified nurse aide award winner is selected by a vote of peers; the scholarship recipient is selected by supervisors. The Myers' Trust also instituted a fund that supplies a floral arrangement to each Partridge-Tippett Nursing Facility resident on his or her birthday.

Tobacco-Free Initiative Update

As announced in the January 2008 issue of *Seasons*, United Methodist Homes campuses will go tobacco-free on July 1, 2008. As of that date, no tobacco use of any kind will be permitted inside or outside any Homes facilities. The change will apply to staff, residents and visitors alike, and includes personal vehicles parked on Homes property, buildings, parking lots and sidewalks.

United Methodist Homes is providing smoking cessation support to interested employees. The Wesley Village Campus recently hosted InterMountain Medical Group family practitioner Mark Puffenberger, MD, who gave a presentation on topics such as the effects of smoking, the addictive qualities of tobacco, the health benefits of quitting, medication options and more. Sessions are being planned for United Methodist Homes' New York campuses.

Employees may also obtain a "Your Quit Kit" folder from any United Methodist Homes' Human Resources office. The kit includes reference and support materials from the American Cancer Society and other organizations. Those wishing to cease tobacco usage have a wide range of options, including counseling, support groups, medication and more. iCOMET is Coming!

hile Halley's Comet only comes around once every 76 years, iCOMET at United Methodist Homes will come around six times before the end of 2008! Phase I of the COMET software implementation will begin at Hilltop's James G. Johnston Nursing Facility on July 1, followed by Elizabeth Church Manor on August 1, the Doris L. Patrick Campus on September 1, non-skilled nursing facilities in New York (Hilltop, Sunset Heights, Highlands, St. Louise Manor, and Manor House) on October 1, the Wesley Village Campus on November 1, and the Tunkhannock Campus on December 1.

Approximately eight weeks prior to each facility/campus go-live date, iCOMET Clinical Project Coordinator Janine Savage will schedule an implementation planning meeting with key facility individuals. At that time, campus "super-users" (staff members comfortable with the software who can help co-workers over rough spots) will be identified, facility staff responsibilities will be outlined and training schedules will be developed.

According to Savage, "Several factors were taken into consideration when the implementation timeline was developed including, but not limited to, the status of current software systems, the implementation team's experiences with the software to date, the MDS [minimum data set] changes for Section S in New York on October 1, the MDS 3.0 implementation schedule, and financial system transition issues. The goal for 2008 is to

replace RCS [resident care system] with the iCOMET software and to replace the UNIX financial software for related billing and accounts receivable functions."

iCOMET users at each campus will be well-supported during the go-live period, both by facility super-users and United Methodist Homes' clinical informaticists, who will be on-site to assist as well. A space-related theme "will hopefully provide some fun and levity during the learning process and launch celebrations," said Savage.
