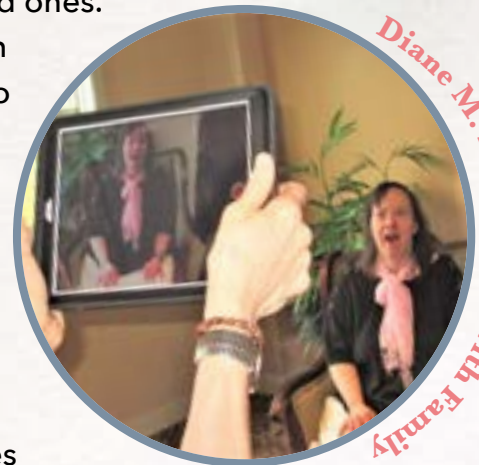

The Foundation is an integral part of creating a home and community for our residents. During COVID-19 restrictions, visitors have not been allowed on campus. This has been an incredible sacrifice for our residents and their loved ones. Because of the previous generous support of others, the Foundation was able to quickly respond to resident needs and purchase close to \$60,000 in equipment such as iPads and tablets to keep residents connected to family and friends, as well as a variety of creative items to keep residents engaged mentally and physically.

Out of concern for community health, the 2020 Foundation Golf Tournament was cancelled, leaving us with a greater need for support. The annual event typically raises over \$55,000 for the Resident Assistance Program. This critical program quietly distributes funds to assisted living/personal care residents that have exhausted their personal financial means; helping to ensure they will always have a home with us.
