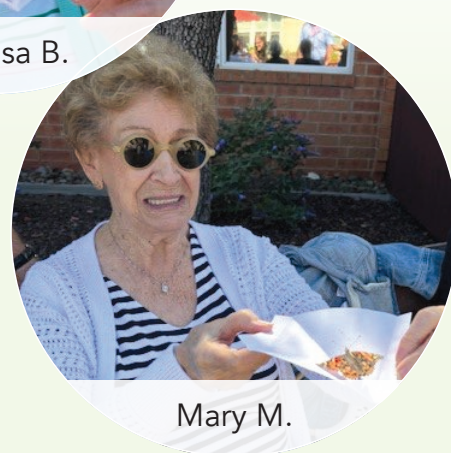

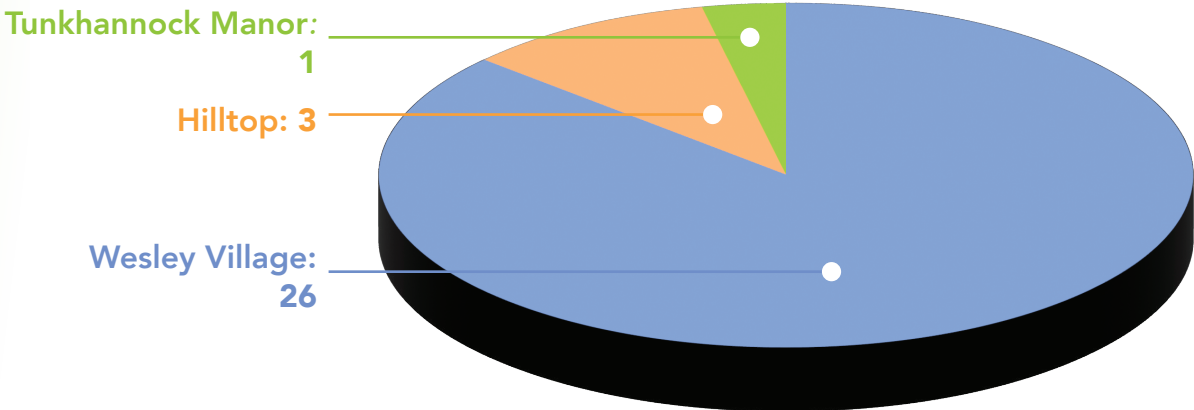


The Impact of the Resident Assistance Program and Charity Care

The Resident Assistance Program was created to ensure that residents in our care will never be asked to leave their home due to lack of finances. This critical benevolence program is one of the greatest needs at United Methodist Homes. Residents receiving assistance may not know the names of the donors but are ever grateful for the support that ensures their continuity of high-quality care.

The generosity of others has enabled the Foundation to quietly distribute funds through the Resident Assistance Program for those that have exhausted their financial means. Charity Care excludes those eligible for Medical Assistance or those eligible for Social Security Income (SSI).

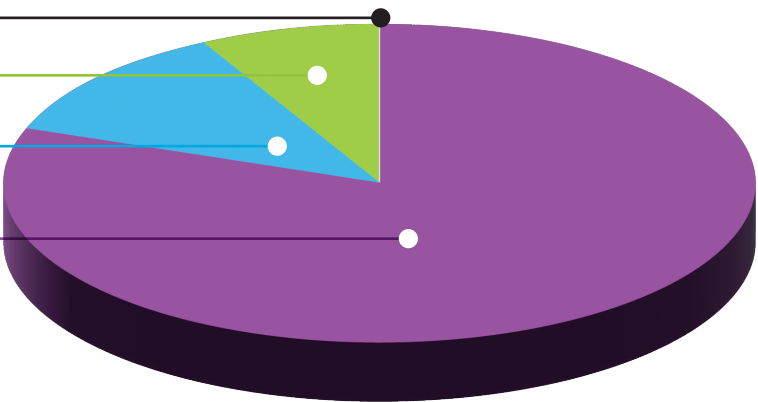
Resident Assistance Program

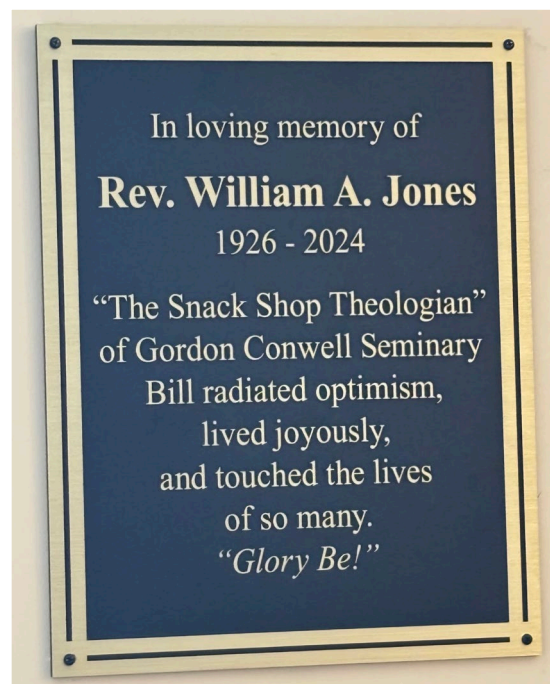

Honoring a Life, Celebrating a Space: The Rev. William Jones Rehab Lounge

Wesley Village recently unveiled a newly dedicated space within its rehabilitation center—the Rev. William Jones Rehab Lounge, honoring the memory of a beloved former patient and community member.

The naming of the lounge was made possible through a generous gift from Rev. Jones's daughter, Gwyn Beagle, and her husband, John, along with his son, Bill Jones, and Bill and Gwyn's aunt, Joyce Schmidt. The space holds deep personal significance for the Jones family. Rev. Jones was a rehab patient at Wesley Village on two occasions. During one of his stays, he and his family, avid Philadelphia Eagles fans, gathered in the lounge to watch their beloved Eagles in the Super Bowl—a special moment that left a lasting impression despite the outcome of the game.

"This space gave our family comfort and togetherness during a difficult time," said Gwyn Beagle. "Naming it in honor of our father felt like the perfect way to give back to the place that gave us those memories."



The family's tribute also honors the vital role of extended loved ones. Aunt Joyce, sister-in-law to Rev. Jones and aunt to Gwyn and Bill, provided care for Rev. Jones at home during the later stages of his life. Her support and compassion were invaluable, reflecting the family's deep commitment to one another.

Bill Jones also expressed heartfelt appreciation for the caregiving team at Wesley Village, noting, "It's a pure reflection of the tangible impact of their hard work caring for a loved one. I'm humbled to have been able to be a small part of 'Dad's room.'"

The newly named Rev. William Jones Rehab Lounge will continue to serve as a welcoming, comfortable space for patients and families—just as it did for the Jones family.
